Membership Trends

- Increased adult membership
 - Reversed the trend of shrinking female participation (growth from 232 to 266 adult members)
 - A result of increased SWURL league offerings
 - Increased participation in west coast ultimate (Corner Brook and Gros Morne)
- Increased youth participation
 - Expanded junior high and elementary provincial tournaments into standalone events
 - Addition of School Sport NL regional tournaments outside the Avalon



Policies & Procedures

New Policies

- Ultimate Canada Code of Conduct and Ethics and Event Discipline Procedure
 - Adopted in January after concerns were raised at a youth tournament.

Sport Development

Role of Sport Development

Sport development director responsibilities:

- Identify and implement opportunities to grow the sport of ultimate
- Oversee the clinics program
- Oversee team and coach selection processes for provincial junior teams
- Provide opportunities to train new coaches in collaboration with the Competition Introduction and Community Initiative learner facilitators
- Work with competitive players and teams to ensure resources are available for their success
- Oversee bid representation and, if necessary, team selection for national-level adult tournaments

Ultimate was named a Foundation Sport in 2018 by School Sports Newfoundland and Labrador!

This partnership led to four SSNL regional high school tournaments involving approximately 230 athletes:

- St. John's Region
- Northern Region
- Northern Peninsula Region
- Central East Region



Two kinds of clinics for members and the public:

- Skills clinics for adult teams
- Developmental clinics for youth groups and schools



Summer Outreach Clinics Program

Annika Bieger, summer clinics co-ordinator

- Facilitate clinic requests from outside groups
- Organize volunteers
- Instruct clinics using the LTAD guide for ultimate





2019 Summer Clinics Program

- 46 clinics for community groups in metro region, Bay Roberts, Old Perlican and Harbour Main
- Over 1,185 participants between the ages of 5 and 14



ISOTG Day - Dec. 3, 2018

- Spoke to youth about spirit and played spirit games
- Partnered with MZU to play spirit games during regular games in the Fall BIY League
- Pete Thompson won a prize from Ultimate Canada for a video on SOTG







NCCP Coaching

- 2019 courses:
 - Community Initiation: 5 participants
 - Competition Introduction: 10 participants
- Total trained coaches:
 - 32 trained community coaches
 - 23 competitive coaches, five of whom who have achieved certified status.
 - One trained competition development coach

Women's Skill Development Series

- 53 participants
- High level of positive feedback
- Many participants indicated they would participate in a skill series again



PE In-service for Teachers

- Offering community coaching course for teachers this month
- Will increase the level of understanding and play of teachers
- If successful, will implement at other age levels, and across the province.



Youth Ultimate

Winter High School League

- Allowed senior high teams the opportunity to compete against other schools before May provincials.
- Participating teams:

2019 Youth Competition Developmental Camp

- Provided Storm-eligible players with focused sessions on skills necessary for higher level ultimate. Participants received a report on how to develop past camp
- Volunteers ran weekly sessions while Storm coaching staff provided report feedback
- 32 registrants (17 male, 15 female), ages 13-18



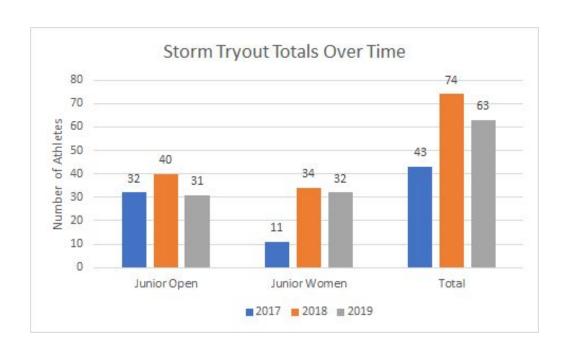
2019 Storm Tryouts

- Objective: build junior open team roster and establish Storm junior women team to compete at CUC juniors.
- Three tryout sessions for each team:
 - Open: April 6, 13, & 20
 - Women: April 17, 20 & May 1
- Tryouts organized and run by coaches:
 - Open: Craig Stoyles (head), Laurel Penney (assistant)
 - Women: Natalie O'Donnell (head), Claire Moore-Gibbons (assistant)



2019 Storm Tryout Results

- 63 junior athletes tried out:
 - 31 Open
 - 32 Women
- More athletes tried out for Storm junior women than open for the first time in the program's history.



2019 Senior High Provincials

- 13 teams from 9 schools competed on May 4-5 at the Techniplex.
- Winner: Holy Heart
- Most Spirited: Mount Pearl A
- New teams: Roncalli A and B
- Noteworthy:
 - 1. Sponsored by VSC
 - First use of Ultimate NL Discipline Policy



2019 Junior High Provincials

- 14 teams from 11 schools competed on May 25-26 at the Techniplex.
- Winner: MPSH 9s
- Most Spirited: Brother Rice Jr. High
- New teams: Roncalli, MacDonald
 Drive, Cowan Heights
- Noteworthy:
 - 1. Sponsored by VSC
 - 2. 10th anniversary



2019 Elementary Provincials

- 8 teams from 6 schools competed on June 2 at the Powerplex.
- Winner: École des Grands-Vents
- Most Spirited: Vanier Red
- Noteworthy:
 - First standalone elementary tournament
 - 2. Riverside Elementary travelled from Clarenville
 - 3. Storm women held a successful 50/50 fundraiser



Lessons Learned from 2019 Provincial Tournaments

- Volunteers continue to be an issue of concern.
- Two tournament directors recommended for future senior high tournaments.
- More than 10 minutes in between games is necessary for future elementary tournaments.
- Is admission something to consider in the future?



2019 Junior High & Elementary Summer League

- Provided opportunity to play summer ultimate i for junior players not on Storm
- Annika Bieger organized the junior high league, focusing on weekly scrimmages
 - 25 registrants
- She also coached the elementary league, focusing on skill development.
 - 33 registrants



Canadian Ultimate Championships: Junior Division (CUC JRs) 2019

- Edmonton, AB: Aug. 11-14
- Natalie O'Donnell Claire and Moore-Gibbons coached 26 junior female athletes: 21 travelled to nationals. The team placed second in most spirited for the second year in a row.
- Craig Stoyles and Laurel Penney coached 18 junior open athletes, included the first female captain in the program's history.





Looking Back: Improvements Implemented for Storm in 2019

- Started Storm program earlier in the year to strengthen strategy and skill.
- Extended trip by flying up one day earlier and leaving the day after the tournament.
- Separated Storm banking account from Ultimate NL's general account.
- Further motivated junior women so that Storm's team didn't require out-of-province players.



Recommendations for Storm in 2020

- Start Storm program even earlier in the year to strengthen strategy and skill
- Expand on conditioning offerings provided this year
- Engage more adult groups to scrimmage against junior team for more high level experience
- Encourage more fundraising

Volunteer Information

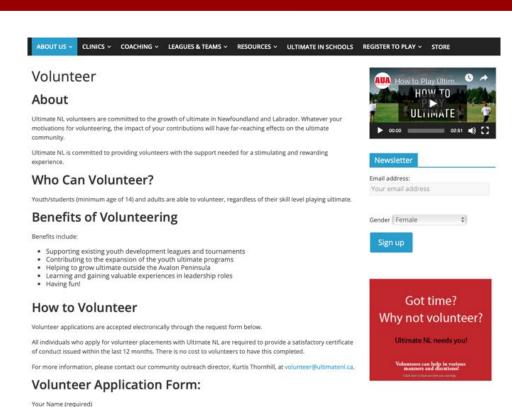
- 46 total volunteers:

- 13 fewer volunteers than
 2018, 9 fewer than 2017
- Plan to address low volunteer initiative is in development
 - Goals established for end of 2019
 - 2020 goals to be completed before end of year





Tournaments & Events

2018-2019 Tournaments

Two new tournaments were added this year:

- Gale 4s tournament
- Elimin8s tournament

Both tournaments drew a great interest of the community and had positive feedbacks

Two annual tournaments were offered. They had great participation, but some adjustments will need to be made to keep the members' interest.

- Huckfest
- Toilet Bowl

Huckfest - December 2018

- Six teams played: 24
 female-matching players and 36
 male-matching players.
- More female-matching players than 2017: 24 vs 15



GALE 4s Tournament - April 2019

- First 4 × 4 indoor ultimate tournament in NL
- Six teams played: 25 femalematching players and 32 malematching players



Elimin8s Tournament - June 2019

- A new format tournament for summer
- Six teams played: 29
 female-matching players and 33
 male-matching players
- Potential improvements:
 - Shorten each game time
 - Change certain rules so each team has more games to play



Art Hawkins - June 2019

- Played the one-hour game at the break of Elimin8s tournament.
- All proceeds, plus a portion of the proceeds from Elimin8s tournament, went towards the Art Hawkins Development Fund.



Toilet Bowl - September 2019

- Only four teams played: 16 female-matching players and 29 male-matching players
- Potential improvement: change of the timing of the tournament to involve more players with different skill levels

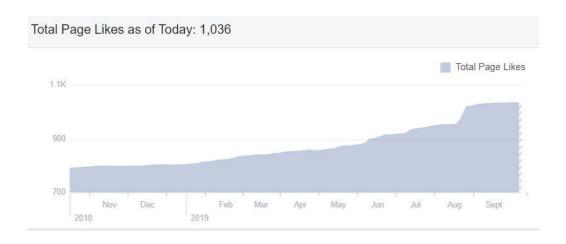
